Scripture Reflection

Today's Scripture passages concentrate on suffering as an offering for sin and for the sake of the Kingdom of God. The First Reading is taken from the end of the fourth song of the Suffering Servant, the work of the second prophet we call Isaiah, collected in the book named for him and his predecessor. Today's selection reminds us that the Servant accomplished the will of God by suffering for the sinfulness of others. As for the earliest disciples of Jesus, they were certain that the servant was the prophesied Messiah, who had lived, died and been raised among them. Jesus was the one who was crushed, who bore our iniquities and who "out of his anguish" saw "the light" in his resurrection.

The reading from Mark's Gospel account, situated immediately after the third prediction of the passion, continues the theme of suffering. However, it begins with James and John's misguided requests for places of honor when Jesus comes into his glory. Jesus responds by asking them if they are ready to drink the cup he will drink and be baptized as he will. They reply confidently but naively, "We can." Jesus recognizes that they do not understand that glory comes through suffering and death.

His cup is the destiny God has prepared for him and his baptism is the Crucifixion. Jesus continues to teach the disciples about his mission explaining that greatness comes, in stark contrast to their request, from service, and the ultimate service will be the handing over of his life. Jesus says to be a leader in the church is not to be a "lord" or "tyrant," but in the kingdom of God rulers must be servants. Jesus offers himself out of sympathy for our weakness, for the sake of humanity, which cannot save itself. I am this servant, Jesus says; are you willing to follow me and to serve me and to serve me through service to all?

Liturgical Reflection ...

General Instruction of the Roman Missal

The chair of the priest celebrant must signify his function of presiding over the gathering and of directing the prayer. The more suitable place for the chair is facing the people at the head of the sanctuary, unless the design of the building prevents this. In any case, the chair is never to resemble a throne. The seat for the Deacon should be placed near that of the priest celebrant. All other ministers' seats should be arranged so that they are clearly distinguishable from the chair of the priest celebrant.
