Scripture Reflection

On Pentecost, the disciples of Jesus were all together in a house when the Holy Spirit blew in with a charismatic plan of action that one suspects was not previously on their minds. The ensuing commotion was so loud and raucous that a crowd gathered outside, and some of the crowd suggested that perhaps the disciples of Jesus had been drinking that morning (Acts 2:13). It was not alcohol that fueled them, though, but the Holy Spirit showing them in deed some of the truths about what it meant to be the church.


First, the disciples "were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." These languages, heard by others in their own native tongues, were a clear sign that the church was not simply a phenomenon meant for a small corner of the world, but for all people. The church's mission was to be universal. Second, the Holy Spirit drew an "amazed and astonished" crowd. Some of them sneered at the disciples, but the majority were attracted to this strange witness of God. The crowds were open to the truth because they had witnessed the power of the Holy Spirit in their midst and the joy of the disciples.

But while the truth always shakes up the world, the Holy Spirit does not always come like a violent wind. The charism of tongues and the presence of large crowds clamoring to find out what is going on are not essential to the work of the Holy Spirit; the Holy Spirit can come quietly, gently, like a light breeze.

Some gifts are so subtle that they go unnoticed by the crowd. The Holy Spirit has so infused the lives of some Christians that their kind words, their loving service, their moral support and their listening ear change lives in the guietest of ways. Apart from the din of crowds, their gifts emanate gently to all who encounter them. A kind word can be "the utterance of knowledge," a shoulder to cry on "the utterance of wisdom." and "all these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses."

Challenges For The Parish

Last week the Department of Code Enforcement of the City of Altoona officially condemned the former school building. Bricks are falling off the structure. The former convent building is close to follow. As was stated earlier in the bulletin, the Parish Finance Council and the Parish Pastoral Council looked into renovating either structure. Having contacted an engineer, the lower cost was \$1.7 million for each building to be renovated and meet code requirements. Both the former school and convent buildings are slated to be razed. We are presently seeking bids on this project. The future use of the property is for much needed parking.

The Parish is in need of space for religious education, sacramental formation, and parish offices. The former Kopp Building (next to the rectory) has been presented to the Cathedral Parish for sale. In light of our needs, both the Finance Council and Parish Council have unanimously supported proceeding with this purchase. The final papers are presently being drawn together for the sale of this property. This is a former warehouse and there is an immediate need to make classrooms for religious education. Religious Education classes have been taking place in the hall for the past year and a half. This is an historic time for the Cathedral Parish as we plan for the future. Each of us will be called upon to be stewards of our time, talent, and treasure.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ has particular significance in the Diocese and the Parish as our Cathedral is under the title of the Blessed Sacrament. General Instruction of the

Fifty days have passed since the celebration of Easter Sunday. Today the Church assigns a Sequence to be sung following the second reading. Every Sunday at Mass the Creed is prayed by all gathered in the assembly. The purpose of the Creed or Profession of Faith is that the whole gathered people may respond to the Word of God proclaimed in the readings taken from sacred Scripture and explained in the Homily. Also, the Creed allows believers to honor and confess the great mysteries of the faith. Today the Church particularly confesses belief in the Holy Spirit, the giver of life, who Roman Missal proceeds from the Father and Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified. It is in the Spirit that the Church gives praise for these fifty days of Easter joy! The General Instruction of the Roman Missal, Numbers 67 and 68.
