Scripture Reflection


One of the most frequent subjects of early Christian art is Jesus the Good Shepherd. The beautiful fresco in Rome's catacomb of Saint Domitilla is representative. In a setting of verdant growth, a young Jesus appears, a sheep draped around his shoulders, while other sheep look longingly at him, symbolizing that as Good Shepherd Christ will lead his followers to paradise.

Though most of us do not have a lot of experience with shepherds, it might seem to us plain foolishness that a shepherd would actually lay down his life for is sheep. What is the point of keeping sheep except to provide for one's own needs? What point is there in saving the sheep if the shepherd dies?

A serious reflection, however, allows us to grasp Jesus' point. True leaders, "good shepherds," are those who seek not their own well-being, but the good of those who are entrusted to their care. While we may not have a lot of contact with shepherds, we can think of examples of people laying down their lives for others. Any parent who has walked the floor in the middle of the night with a sick or fussy baby knows what it means to lay down one's life. Any child who cares for an aging parent with patience knows what it means to lay down one's life. Any employer or supervisor who stays late at the office figuring out how to tweak the budget, or forgoes a bonus in order not to lay anyone off, knows what it means to lay down one's life. All of these involve a kind of dying to self so that others might have life in its fullness.

On the Fourth Sunday of Easter we always celebrate Jesus, the Good Shepherd, who protects his flock, provides for our needs, and goes in search of any sheep that are lost. This is also the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. Pray for holy shepherds. Pray for your priests. Pray for seminarians. As Pope Francis says, "How wonderful it is to be surprised by God's call, to embrace his word, to walk in the footsteps of Jesus, in adoration of the divine mystery and in generous service to our neighbors!" Pray for members of the Church to come forward to serve as good shepherds.

General

Roman Missal

A genuflection, made by bending the right knee to the ground, signifies adoration. Genuflection is reserved for the Most Blessed Sacrament. During Mass, three genuflections are made by the Priest Celebrant: following the elevation of the consecrated Host, after the elevation of the consecrated Chalice, and before Communion. A bow signifies reverence and honor shown to the persons themselves or to the signs that represent them. There are two kinds of bow: a bow of the head and a bow of the body. A bow of the head is made when the three Divine Persons are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated. A bow of the body, a profound bow, is made to the altar and during the Creed.
