Scripture Reflection

How do relationships begin? There is naturally not just one way, one place or one word needed to start a relationship. But is there a common process by which friendship is built? Some friendships begin in childhood, while others start late in life, but some factors, it seems, are essential to every friendship.

Attentive listening is essential to begin any friendship, but an introduction is often necessary, especially to God, whose voice can be mistaken, ignored or overlooked in a world that values distraction over patient listening. An introduction, however, is not enough if there is no openness to begin and maintain a relationship. We see this openness to build a relationship with two of John the Baptist's disciples. John introduced his disciples to Jesus, saying, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!" John's disciples take this introduction as an opportunity to follow after Jesus. When Jesus saw them following, he asked them, "What are you looking for?" Their response tells us they were looking for a friend, for they asked Jesus where he was staying. Jesus offered them an open invitation: "Come and see." They accepted the invitation. It is time together that creates friendship.

And friendship begets friendship. We see this with Andrew, who was one of John's two disciples. After getting to know Jesus, he returned to tell his brother Simon, proclaiming, "We have found the Messiah." Andrew, who now knew Jesus, needed to share this friendship with his brother. And when Andrew brought Simon to Jesus, Jesus gave him the name Cephas, Aramaic for "rock." Jesus, of course, had intimate knowledge of Simon, for friends give nicknames based on their knowledge of who a person is. Attentiveness, openness, time and knowledge of each other create and sustain friendships.

There is no substitute in friendship for time; the more time we spend in conversation with God, the more deeply we know God. And the more God's love animates us, the more we are able to offer ourselves to others around us with love. True love makes us unable to accept any other sort of relationship, because to know someone deeply is to see God in them and to wish for them the true freedom that comes from being a friend of God.

Cathedral Parish in Midst of Decision Making

There is a need to provide a permanent space for Religious Education for the Parish. Last winter the furnace broke in the former school building. Since that time religious education classes have been occurring in the Cathedral Hall on a temporary basis. Renovation and upgrades to meet building codes for either the former convent building or school building have been estimated by engineers at \$1.7 million for each building. A three story building is presently for sale next to the rectory. This building could provide: (1) office space on the first floor for the parish (moving the office from the rectory into a site separate from the residency for the clergy); (2) Religious Education on the second floor for Pre-K through eighth grade along with Catechesis of the Good Shepherd; (3) the third floor (lower level) could be an activities center with a kitchen and open area to seat a large number of people. The cost of purchase and renovation of this possible building is estimated to be half of the cost to upgrade either of the two other buildings. We realize this decision will involve seeking gifts from parishioners to make this project possible. Councils from the parish continue to meet to discuss the possibility of this project. Please pray with us as we review and discuss the facts surrounding this decision.
