Scripture Reflection

All four Gospels record the story of John's baptizing ministry. Matthew and Luke have as their source the Gospel of Mark. John's source is independent. Despite their slight differences, they all agree that John deferred to Jesus, recognizing that "one mightier than I is coming after me". In Mark's account of Jesus' baptism, the descent of the Spirit occurs immediately as Jesus comes up out of the water. A voice from heaven addresses Jesus directly: "You are my beloved son." Mark suggests that this was a personal revelation meant only for Jesus. Matthew's account is slightly different. The voice from the heavens speaks to all present, "This is my beloved Son." Throughout Mark's Gospel, Jesus' true identity is not made public until after his crucifixion, since Mark's portrayal of Jesus is as the suffering Messiah.

John the Baptist preaches that compared to Jesus, who baptizes with the Holy Spirit, he himself is not even fit to be a servant who unties Jesus' sandal. This greater status of Jesus is based on his relationship to the Father and the Spirit. The Spirit comes upon Jesus and a voice from heaven testifies that Jesus is God's Son. Jesus becomes the Spirit-bearer, and the first thing that this implies is shown right after today's reading: "At once the Spirit drove him out into the desert". The verb is a powerful one that is often used to describe Jesus driving out demons. Coming in the power of the Spirit means his complete submission to the way the Spirit works in his life. Out in the wilderness to which the Spirit drives Jesus are Satan and wild animals. But the Spirit and ministering angels also appear there.

Mark's account of the baptism of Jesus portrays the inner life of Jesus as one empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit and, as a result, the unique giver of the Spirit who will liberate humanity. This is the same Spirit received in the Sacrament of Baptism. Claimed for Christ, we walk in the strength and power of the Holy Spirit.

Cathedral Parish in Midst of Decision Making

There is a need to provide a permanent space for Religious Education for the Parish. Last winter the furnace broke in the former school building. Since that time religious education classes have been occurring in the Cathedral Hall on a temporary basis. Renovation and upgrades to meet building codes for either the former convent building or school building have been estimated by engineers at \$1.7 million for each building. A three story building is presently for sale next to the rectory. This building could provide: (1) office space on the first floor for the parish (moving the office from the rectory into a site separate from the residency for the clergy); (2) Religious Education on the second floor for Pre-K through eighth grade along with Catechesis of the Good Shepherd; (3) the third floor (lower level) could be an activities center with a kitchen and open area to seat a large number of people. The cost of purchase and renovation of this possible building is estimated to be half of the cost to upgrade either of the two other buildings. We realize this decision will involve seeking gifts from parishioners to make this project possible. Councils from the parish continue to meet to discuss the possibility of this project. Please pray with us as we review and discuss the facts surrounding this decision.

Directives With Regard to the Flu Season

Because of the seriousness of this flu season, Bishop Bartchak has asked that the Precious Blood of the Lord not be offered at Mass temporarily. It is the belief of the Catholic Church that the whole Body of Christ is present under either form of consecrated bread or wine. Also, the exchange of the sign of peace should avoid bodily contact. A reverent nod with eye contact and a smile will be the temporary practice. Reception of Holy Communion on the hand is encouraged; however, reception on the tongue may not be denied. Today concludes the great season of Christmas. We commemorate the baptism of the Savior in the waters of the Jordan by John the Baptist. It is a day when believers recall our baptism into the dying and rising of the Lord. At baptism we are claimed for Jesus Christ. By baptism we are called to the altar where we eat and drink the Body and Blood of Christ. The Instruction of the Roman Missal clearly states that by virtue of our baptism, Christians have a right and duty to gather and participate at Mass. It is our baptism that draws us Sunday after Sunday into the celebration of the saving mysteries. Without baptism we would never know of the redeeming mysteries of Christ celebrated at Mass.
