Scripture Reflection

In today's Gospel parable, the widow elicits great empathy from listeners and readers. The Hebrew word for widow is related to a word that means "one who has no voice," but her voice is her only hope to achieve the justice she desires. This parable is often presented as a teaching on the effects of persistent prayer. Through her persistence the widow persuades the judge to grant her request, though he does so grudgingly. He is unlike God, who desires to see that justice is done "speedily."

The First Reading offers another insight into the effects of prayer. With Moses, it is the support of others that allowed him to be in touch with God. The might of Moses' staff alone is not enough to assure victory. Aaron and Hur must come to his aid. Thus the battle is ultimately won through the united efforts of the community. The role of the community is an important element in the prayer of the people of God.

Rather than changing God's mind, prayer changes us, little by little, even when it seems that the challenges are too much. Faith is nurtured by gratitude and frequent prayer. Faith is food for the journey whose length and challenges can sometimes weigh us down and distract us from God. In the spiritual life, it is necessary to persevere and to join with friends when the battle is hard. To draw sustenance. we must continue to go to the sources that refresh us: friends, prayer, the sacraments, the Mass and Scripture, all of which equip us for the spiritual journey, and to recognize that God is always with us too, truly walking at our side.

There is a need for additional ministers at our weekly Sunday liturgies. Cathedral Masses are scheduled every Saturday at 5:00 PM, and on Sunday at 8:00 AM, 10:00 AM, Noon, and 5:00 PM. Your stewardship of time and talent will greatly serve the needs of our Parish.

These are the various opportunities available to you and your family.

Ushers: These are men and women who extend hospitality to all; are available for emergencies; help take up the collection; and give bulletins at the end of Mass.

Altar Servers: Children (fourth grade and up) and adults who assist the priest at Mass. Servers process in and out with cross and candles; light the candles; hold the Roman Missal: dress and undress the altar: and help with the preparation of the gifts.

Readers: Adults and youth, male and female, who proclaim the first and second reading at Mass. Your ability to proclaim God's revealed Word nourishes all gathered for worship.

Choir: Men, women, and youth volunteer their voices in praise of God. Choir rehearsals are every Thursday evening. The choir regularly sings at the Sunday 10:00 AM Mass and at special diocesan events.

Cantors: Men, women, and youth who lead the assembly in song, giving praise and thanks to God. Cantors are song leaders who invite all gathered to fully participate in the Mass.

Commentators: Men, women, and youth who pray the Universal Prayer (General Intercessions) following the Creed at Mass. This ministry voices the petitions of the Church.

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion: Fully initiated Catholics who have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist help distribute the consecrated elements of Bread and Wine to the assembly. These ministers help give the Body and Blood of Christ in the absence of the ordained priest and deacon.

Prayerfully consider your possible call to serve in any of these ministries. You may choose more than one liturgical ministry. The Parish Liturgy Committee decided not to have the usual fall workshop for all ministries, but rather to meet individually with each ministry. Before those meetings are scheduled, there is a need for additional volunteers to come forward and offer your time and talent.
