### Scripture Reflection

As Peter and the other Apostles stand before the Sanhedrin in the First Reading, we remember Jesus' condemnation by that group. The Apostles' preaching has been effective, and the Sanhedrin fears it will be blamed for Jesus' Crucifixion. Peter boldly asserts that the Apostles are not subject to orders of the court, but only to God, and their preaching is rooted in the tradition of Israel. Surprisingly, they are dismissed with a reprimand and leave "rejoicing that they had been found worthy to suffer dishonor" in Christ's name.

John layers many meanings into his stories. As in other post-Resurrection appearances, the disciples do not recognize Jesus immediately. Still grieving and confused, they have returned to fishing, but Jesus calls them away from their nets once again. That moment of recognition is exciting---for the disciples and for us readers. The encounter must have felt so familiar---a meal, which included both food Jesus had prepared for them and some they provided from their catch.


The conversation with Peter after the meal is a "call" story in which Peter must first pledge his love for the Lord before he is ready for ministry. Jesus begins the conversation with Peter, asking him if he loves Jesus. It is a powerful scene, in which Peter is challenged three times, the same number as his denials. to declare his love for his teacher. The fearful Peter who denied Jesus three times prior to his crucifixion is gone, replaced by a Peter who has been arrested for speaking boldly of the new life to be found in Jesus' name. Already told "not to teach in this name," Peter and the others could only answer, "We must obey God rather than any human authority." It was the experience of the witness of the risen Jesus that inspired Peter to speak with boldness.

• Imagine yourself sitting on the shore with the risen Lord and the disciples. What do you want to say to Jesus? How would vou respond to his question about whether you love him? How would you share his resurrection with others?

JUBILEE YEAR OF

**MERCY** 

This Third Sunday of Easter, we look at the Spiritual Work of Mercy to instruct the ignorant or to **teach the uneducated**. Teaching the basics of life and the faith is everyone's work, but it especially belongs to parents. Such parental teaching extends beyond religious instruction into all of life: how to relate with others; how to handle money; how to be generous, kind and loving toward neighbors; how to have a healthy sexuality; how to be morally upright; and how to listen to one's conscience in decision making. We teach mercy to each other in the coming and going of everyday life. When we live lives of integrity, we teach mercy. When we see injustice, selfishness, mean behavior, or dishonest activity, we teach those around us by our response. People see us turn the other cheek; do the honest thing; treat people with respect; and by watching us, they learn how to be merciful.
