Scripture Reflection

The story of Jesus' encounter with the Samaritan woman is the first in a trilogy of readings from John on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent. Jesus' revelation "I am he, the one speaking with you" is one of several "I am" statements found in John's Gospel account. The entire story is rich with images of Baptism, Eucharist, and Reconciliation. In this intimate dialogue, Jesus reveals himself as the Messiah who comes from the Father to give water to all who thirst for eternal life.

Perhaps the metaphor of thirst, even more than the metaphor of hunger, conveys the desperation of the soul's need for God. We might pass a day or two or even more without food and experience only mild discomfort. But cut off from water, we are quickly afflicted with thirst: we experience it as an immediate threat to our life and health. The Samaritan woman must already feel the pangs of spiritual thirst. Though initially disconcerted by being addressed by a Jewish man, she engages him in conversation, yearning for the living water that he offers, bringing relief to her life of spiritual longing. Lent is an opportunity to let ourselves feel our spiritual thirst and to welcome the living water that Jesus offers.

The key image in today's readings is living water. Christians first experience this living water through Baptism. During Lent the elect are preparing for Baptism, and the rest of us accompany them as we prepare to renew our baptismal vows at Easter. Rediscover the powerful reality of your Baptism. Focus your prayer this week on our baptismal promises so that you will be ready to renew them at Easter. Baptism is central to Lenten spirituality.

Our Capital Campaign

Gifts continue to be made to the Parish Capital Campaign. Our total in pledges to date is: \$1,336,857.25. Last fall the Cathedral Parish was gifted with the Homer Poulos Estate. The Parish received \$46.644.25: these monies have been added to the capital campaign as we needed initial funds. The goal was set at 1,200,000; and we have met the goal for the renovation of the interior and exterior of the newly purchased building on Thirteenth Avenue, the demolition of the two buildings, and the creation of a new parking lot. Additional monies help with costs associated with the campaign company and the engineering firm drawing up the specifications for the three-floor building to be submitted to the city's Code Office. Parishioners are encouraged to be part of this historic moment in our history. Beginning this Sunday at the 10:00 AM Mass, the Church will celebrate the three scrutinies with our Elect and Candidates. On the Third Sunday of Lent, February 28, the Gospel will tell the story of the woman at the well; on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, March 6, the Gospel will tell of the man born blind who regained his sight; and on the Fifth Sunday of Lent, March 13, the Gospel will proclaim the story of Lazarus being called from his grave into life. The scrutinies are not only for our Elect and Candidates, but also for us, the fully initiated. We are to look deeply and seriously at our lives these Lenten days and see what needs to be cleansed of sin and what calls us closer to our God. Please enter the next three weeks with open hearts as we prepare to die and rise with Christ after the forty days of Lent. At the conclusion of the First Scrutiny, our Elect and Candidates receive the gift of the Creed from the assembled at Mass. Those preparing for the Easter Sacraments will stand throughout the body of the Cathedral Church and receive the Profession of Faith from parishioners gathered at the 10:00 AM Mass.

NOTE: For the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Sundays of Lent, the scriptural readings will be from Cycle A.

ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL 2016

Many parishioners have received their letter for this year's Annual Appeal.
