Scripture Reflection

Today's Gospel passage from Luke may seem a rather curious choice for this Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. It is from the Passion narrative that is proclaimed on Palm Sunday. Although we think of Christ as our king, he rejected that title throughout his life. The sign on the Cross that proclaimed him King of the Jews, while in fact true, was intended to be ironic. His entire public ministry was in many ways the opposite of the common image of a king. He spent his life not overpowering but empowering. He went about healing and unifying, forgiving and making others whole again---without exceptions.

On the Cross he died the way he lived, extending the gift of forgiveness and eternal life to one more sinner. Forgiveness from a king is a powerful gesture; you don't really know if you deserve it, yet it comes freely and your life is changed. The kingship of Christ that we celebrate today was defined by his integrity; what he preached in life; as he died doing.

The yearlong Jubilee of Mercy ends today. Christ our King embraced with love those qualities we sometimes negate. Christ the King, crucified for love of us, embraced limitation, humility, weakness, powerlessness, sin, and death. God's mercy was evident on the cross. Mercy is the face of God. In our weakness and our powerlessness, we find our God. This year has been a rich opportunity to share humility, compassion, and mercy with others. Judgment placed Christ on the cross. May we refrain from judging, and always see understanding and mercy as the qualities of our Savior King.
