Scripture Reflection

In Luke's story of Zacchaeus, Jesus fulfills the very role that he "has come to seek and to save what was lost." There is something amusing and even ridiculous about the plight of Zacchaeus. He is no ordinary tax collector (a group despised by the citizens), he is the chief tax collector. He must have been slightly embarrassed - a person of his position having to climb a tree to see Jesus. But he sets aside any personal inhibitions and climbs up. Then an amazing thing happens, Jesus announces that he is coming to stay at his house. Jesus becomes both guest and host at the table of a sinner.

What makes this story so appealing is the joy that both Jesus and Zacchaeus show in meeting each other. "Come down quickly," Jesus says, "for today I must stay at your house". Zacchaeus drops quickly and receives Jesus with joy. The crowd, however, does not share in their joy. They grumble about a prophet eating with a sinner! Zacchaeus holds his ground, saying that if--notice the "if"---he has defrauded anyone, he will make amends four-fold, keeping to the strictest restitution demanded by the law. Jesus, not to be overdone in generosity, proclaims: "Today salvation has come to this house."

Zacchaeus is transformed by his encounter with Jesus, when he turns concretely from his sin and meets salvation incarnate in the person and promise of Jesus. It is precisely in the midst of human sin and misery that Jesus the Good Shepherd comes seeking us out to redeem us and our suffering. Sometimes we can find ourselves "up a tree," even in our relationship with God. Remember Zacchaeus. Jesus brought him down safely, and restored him to the community. This is why the Lord still comes into our lives: to bring salvation to our own house.

When have you experienced the mercy that Jesus shows Zacchaeus? What keeps you from seeing as God sees and what helps you see people's sins as doors to repentance?

CATHEDRAL PARISHIONERS

There is a need for additional ministers at our weekly Sunday liturgies. Cathedral Masses are scheduled every Saturday at 5:00 PM, and on Sunday at 8:00 AM, 10:00 AM, Noon, and 5:00 PM. Your stewardship of time and talent will greatly serve the needs of our Parish.

These are the various opportunities available to you and your family.

Ushers: These are men and women who extend hospitality to all; are available for emergencies; help take up the collection; and give bulletins at the end of Mass.

Altar Servers: Children (fourth grade and up) and adults who assist the priest at Mass. Servers process in and out with cross and candles; light the candles; hold the Roman Missal: dress and undress the altar: and help with the preparation of the gifts.

Readers: Adults and youth, male and female, who proclaim the first and second reading at Mass. Your ability to proclaim God's revealed Word nourishes all gathered for worship.

Choir: Men, women, and youth volunteer their voices in praise of God. Choir rehearsals are every Thursday evening. The choir regularly sings at the Sunday 10:00 AM Mass and at special diocesan events.

Cantors: Men, women, and youth who lead the assembly in song, giving praise and thanks to God. Cantors are song leaders who invite all gathered to fully participate in the Mass.

Commentators: Men, women, and youth who pray the Universal Prayer (General Intercessions) following the Creed at Mass. This ministry voices the petitions of the Church.

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion: Fully initiated Catholics who have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist help distribute the consecrated elements of Bread and Wine to the assembly. These ministers help give the Body and Blood of Christ in the absence of the ordained priest and deacon.

Prayerfully consider your possible call to serve in any of these ministries. You may choose more than one liturgical ministry. The Parish Liturgy Committee decided not to have the usual fall workshop for all ministries, but rather to meet individually with each ministry. Before those meetings are scheduled, there is a need for additional volunteers to come forward and offer vour time and talent. So there would be a balance of stainedglass and clear glass throughout the structure. The stained-glass comes from the chapel of the second convent that was located across from the Cathedral.

Some Interesting Statistics

We are asked to prepare a General Statictics Report for the Diocese each fall. Here are a few facts we noted while comparing this year to last year. We have had eight more Baptisms of infants and seven more individuals were received into Full Communion with the Catholic Church. We added nine more families (bringing our total to 984). We have twenty-one more children but we had six less First Communicants and seven less in the Confirmation class. We had one less Marriage and three more deaths. Our membership total is 1988.
