Scripture Reflection

What comfort is there in waiting? Comfort is usually not found waiting for an appointment at the doctor's office as the minutes tick away. Then you simply hope, as frustration builds, that you can get out as quickly as possible and get on with your life. This sort of ordinary, everyday hope has to do with desires and wishes that come and go and quickly pass.

But there is another kind of waiting that brings deeper comfort because it is based upon more fundamental hope. Fundamental hope does not have to do with "having" or "acquiring," but is focused on the welfare of people and our hope of salvation. Josef Pieper spoke of fundamental hope as arising when everyday hopes withered and blew away. "Out of the loss of common, everyday hope true hope arises," wrote Pieper in *Hope and History*. This is the hope of the martyrs, which persists when all human hopes have been vanquished.

This fundamental hope, grounded in the being of the living God of Israel, led Isaiah to call out, "Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God." It is the promise of God himself, who will act in the future for his people. The hope of the early Christians was that Jesus would indeed enact the hopes of Isaiah, establishing the kingdom of never-ending peace and righteousness, the end of waiting in exile banished. When the kingdom was not established in the way the early Christians had hoped, but through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the disciples did not abandon Jesus or his promises but relied upon a more fundamental hope: the truthfulness and faithfulness of God to do what God had promised in a time that is not our own and does not adhere to human schedules or calculations.

It is the more fundamental reality that gives us deep comfort: Jesus will return and in the returning of Jesus our deepest needs are met. Our waiting is not the absence of hope, or hope in a dreary waiting room, or dreams that do not come to fruition. It is the comfort of the living God, who comes to us when ordinary hopes disappear and who is coming to us even now. And the joy of this hope gives comfort even in the waiting.

Mary was preserved from the stain of sin by virtue of the death and resurrection of her Son. Catholics are obligated to participate at Mass twice, first, on the Second Sunday of Advent and, second, on Monday, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception.
