Scripture Reflection

Today's readings show us God as a nurturer, feeding us and caring for us. His words of forgiveness and renewal in the First Reading are proclaimed to the people in exile, encouraging them to come and receive all that he offers. Being invited to God's banquet is a sign of reconciliation and peace.

God's love is a spiritual reality. Paul claims that hardship, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril or sword will not "separate us from the love of Christ." Paul boldly proclaims "that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." This is a promise of God's eternal love for humanity and demonstrates the core reality that love is the heart of God's being and the promise of our future regardless of our current situation.

The historian of Rome, Michael Grant, has written about how the poor were despised in Jesus's time. He points out that there is not one Roman writer who had anything but contempt for those in need. The poor were subjected to insult, blamed for their poverty and lived without hope. Imagine how they felt when they heard that when Jesus saw the crowd, "his heart was moved with pity for them." Jesus gave them a banquet and all ate until they were satisfied. If we seek the heart of Jesus, we will discover it in the heart of the poor.

The bishop is to be looked upon as the high priest of his flock. Therefore all should hold in great esteem the liturgical life of the diocese centered around the bishop, especially in the cathedral church. The preeminent manifestation of the Church is present in the full, active participation of all God's holy people, especially at Mass, in a single prayer, at one altar at which the bishop presides, surrounded by his college of priests and by his ministers. As the bishop cannot be present over the whole flock of the Church, local parishes are established under the pastor taking the place of the bishop. Therefore both in attitude and in practice the liturgical life of the parish and its relationship to the bishop must be fostered among the faithful and clergy.
