Scripture Reflection

Today the readings from Cycle A are proclaimed at Mass. Our elect (seeking Baptism, and Eucharist) and our Candidates (seeking Confirmation) celebrate the First Scrutiny. They are to name their thirsts as they stand with the woman at the well. We, too, are to name our thirsts.

A canticle from Isaiah sings that we shall draw water joyfully from the well-springs of salvation (Isaiah 12:3). Water bookends our readings and our lives of faith. The Israelites grumble in their thirst. Moses cries out to God in exasperation. God gives people water from a rock. An extraordinary event made known that the Lord was in their midst.

Jesus gave a Samaritan woman more than water by ordinary means--dialogue and presence. The story is not ordinary. Why? Jews considered Samaritans to be less than human. Men did not speak to women in public. But Jesus spoke to this Samaritan woman in a public place. His request, "Give me a drink," put himself in need of her and began a conversation that satisfied her deeper thirst for God and acceptance. Jesus suggests that the woman should ask him for water and he would give her living water. Though she failed to understand at first, her quest for water leads her to recognize Jesus as the messiah. Transformed, she returns to the people that she tried to avoid and shares her experience. She led the people she tried to avoid to Jesus. Their encounter with him transformed them. They came to know that the Savior, the Lord, was in their midst.

Today's readings point out that water is a natural and spiritual gift. As Moses strikes the rock, God gives life to the Israelites by providing water for them to drink. In the encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well, Jesus promises life giving water, the gift of eternal life. At Easter, we celebrate the life received in the waters of Baptism.

How does the water of Baptism continue to quench your thirsts?

Lent began March 6th. If you gave serious thought to the **1-1-1 Plan:** one sin, one add-in, one give-up. (1) Focusing on one sin or fault that is getting in the way of your relationship with God. (2) Adding a positive activity that will deepen your prayer and spiritual life. (3) Denying yourself things you really like or are attached to. You still have time to reset!

The Three Scrutinies

On the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent the Cathedral Parish will celebrate the formal rites of scrutiny with our Elect (those to receive Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist) and our Candidates (those already one with us by Baptism who seek full membership in the Catholic Church). This rite will be celebrated at the 10:00 A.M. Mass on March 24th,31st, and April 7th. Please note that the scriptures on these Sundays at all Masses will be from Cycle A readings. The annual Gospels for each scrutiny are: the woman at the well (March 24th), the man born blind (March 31st), and Lazarus raised from the dead (April 7th). Like the Elect and Candidates, we too are called to scrutinize our lives and name those sins that must die so that we may more fully live our life in Christ. Lent is a serious time to turn from sin and return to the Lord. Be ready to scrutinize, to name your sins, and seek renewed life in Jesus Christ.

ADORATION

Pope Saint John Paul II said that "adoration of the Most Holy Sacrament is an important daily practice and becomes inexhaustible source of holiness." Believers place themselves in the divine presence of the Lord who suffered and died for our salvation when praying before the Holy Sacrament. This is the source of our spiritual nourishment as we pray before the holy bread that has become the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ.
