# Scripture Reflection

Matthew wants to show us Peter's walk. Although similar narratives appear in Mark and John, only Matthew includes the account of Peter walking on water. Here Matthew shows us one of his favorite themes: grace conquering fear. Matthew took an account that affirmed Jesus' divinity and crafted it into a lesson on the power of faith.

As a first step to faith, Matthew teaches Christians to leave security behind. Humans will cling to the flimsiest refuge. To follow Christ, we have to venture out into the full fury of life's storm and leave our fantasies of security behind. We know we can do this because the same Jesus who summoned Peter to leave the boat remains with us today, challenging us to do the same. Too often we let the storm drown out the summons. Perhaps we confuse the noise with God.

Perhaps we know the noise is not God, but we forget that God is stronger. Peter was in Jesus' own presence. He saw Jesus walk on water and heard him say, "Come!" Even this was not enough for him to ignore the storm. He was a sailor, and he knew the danger of a storm at sea. He had no comparable memory or skill to help him understand how to walk on water. When we pursue power, wealth, fame or ego, we fashion idols of noise, petty gods whose thundering demands allow not a moment of rest. Just as likely, we find ourselves in Peter's condition: followers of Christ and recipients of his grace who still hesitate before the commotion of the world's storms.

We may sink a few times in the process, but we can rely on Christ to teach us to walk on water. This practice will take many forms. The rookie volunteer who teaches a sixth-grade religion class is walking on water. The college graduate who joins a service corps to perform works of mercy in a tough neighborhood is walking on water. The Knights of Columbus who endure isolation and misunderstanding to promote the Gospel of life are walking on water. The parents who choose--sometimes against the advice of doctors---to give birth to a handicapped child are walking on water.

# Why Sing the Psalms at Mass?

The Psalms are an integral part of Catholic worship. Historically, we receive the Psalms from our Jewish heritage. Jesus would have joined in the singing of the Psalms at synagogue worship. The New Testament contains 129 of the 150 Psalms; many of them on the mouth of the Master himself. Scripture gives witness that the very early church communities when gathered at worship sang the Psalms. This is indicative of the tradition of praying the Psalms being passed from the Jewish to the Christian tradition.

The Second Vatican Council directed a sung Psalm between the scripture readings. Encouraging the full, active and conscious participation of all at Liturgy, the Church invites the assembly to join in singing the Psalm. The Responsorial Psalm follows the first reading. Because it is an integral part of the Liturgy of the Word, it has great liturgical and pastoral significance. Corresponding to the reading that it follows, the Responsorial Psalm is intended to foster meditation on the Word of God. Its musical setting should aid this, being crafted to not overshadow the other readings.

As a rule the Psalm should be sung. The Psalm is sung responsorially. The psalmist, or cantor of the psalm, sings the Psalm verses and the whole assembly joins in singing the response; this way is given preference. The Psalm may also be sung directly, where there is no intervening response by the community. In this instance the Psalm is sung either by the psalmist alone or all sing it together. The Responsorial Psalm at Mass is always to be a scriptural Psalm. Songs and hymns may not be used in place of the Responsorial Psalm.

From their inception, the Psalms were never meant to be recited. Psalms have always been sung. Even when singing the full Psalm is not possible at Mass, at least the refrain between the verses should be sung. Everyone gathered at Mass is invited to join in singing the refrain of the Psalm. Music is a way for God to lead us to the realm of higher things. As Saint Augustine says, "Singing is for the one who loves." Music and singing are therefore a sign of God's love for us and our love for him. The Psalms witness God's love for us; we sing his praises; we rejoice, lament our failings, and recall his marvelous deeds. We sing the Psalms, as did our forefathers and foremothers, to give God his glory and to praise God's majesty.

# **Holy Day Tuesday**



# ORDER OF CELEBRATING MATRIMONY

Following the Consent (marriage vows) of the couple, the revised *Order of Celebrating Matrimony* directs the Reception of the Consent. The priest or deacon addresses the bride and bridegroom asking God to strengthen the Consent made before the Church. An acclamation on the part of the assembly follows. The acclamation may be sung. This acclamation could be the alleluias of the Gospel acclamation; the refrain of the responsorial psalm; the refrain to the *Glory to God*; or any appropriate acclamation of praise. The cantor would lead those gathered for the wedding in this refrain of praise to God. This addition to the revised rite gives those present for the Sacrament of Matrimony to publicly give thanks to God for the marriage of this couple.
