### Scripture Reflection

The evangelist knew the compelling nature of Jesus' call. At the start, a life of discipleship promises fulfillment, wisdom and grace, as well as potential honor and status. In his preaching this week, Jesus offers his disciples no such illusions. His "Mission Discourse," the second of five great sermons in Matthew's Gospel, promises hostility and rejection and offers only abandonment to divine providence as a hope of comfort.

Hostility to Jesus and his message had already begun. The debate over his ability to forgive sins had turned some faithful Jews against him. Now he had doubled down on his claims and was sending his disciples out to spread this same message throughout Judea and Galilee. It is easy to imagine friends and family quietly begging the Twelve not to go; it is easy to imagine the disciples wondering what they had gotten themselves into.

The Twelve must have sensed they were passing a point of no return. "Whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." Jesus read the same Hebrew Scriptures we read, and much of what he knew of his Father he learned from their message. It is only in abandoning themselves to this providence that the disciples could find the wisdom and grace they had hoped for.

Discipleship today requires the same selfdenial. We need to speak Christ's words in our own voice. We need to forsake our ambitions and follow his path. We need to withdraw from clan and class and serve his poor. We have to pass the same point of no return. We will confuse our families and maybe even lose a few friends. The grace we seek is ours only when we give ourselves over completely to Christ's mission.

#### **Review – Reception of Holy Communion**

Often people ask about the proper reverence for the reception of Holy Communion at Mass. Here is a review of the Church's directives. Faithful to the Lord's command to his disciples to "take and eat" and "take and drink," the assembly completes the Eucharistic action by eating and drinking together the Body and Blood of Christ consecrated during that Mass. For this reason, the faithful should not ordinarily be given Holy Communion from the tabernacle.

Although a communion procession is not obligatory and is not always possible, it should be the normal arrangement for both practical and symbolic reasons. It expresses the humble patience of the poor moving forward to be fed, the alert expectancy of God's people sharing the paschal meal in readiness for their journey, the joyful confidence of God's people on the march towards the promised land. We are a pilgrim people on journey to the kingdom of God.

In the United States of America, Holy Communion may be received in the hand as well as on the tongue; the choice is the prerogative of the communicant. The faithful are not permitted to pick up the consecrated bread or the sacred chalice themselves and still less to hand them to one another. When receiving the Eucharist in the hand, the communicant approaches the minister with one hand resting on the other. After responding, "Amen," the communicant steps to the side and reverently places the consecrated Host in his or her mouth. When Communion is given under both kinds, bread and wine, the communicant may choose to drink from the chalice or may choose not to drink from the chalice.

The norm for the posture of reception of Holy Communion in the dioceses of the United States is standing. The show of respect and reverence is a bow of the head in front of the Sacrament before responding "Amen" to the minister. When Holy Communion is received under both kinds, the sign of reverence, the bow, is also made before the Precious Blood. All are invited to sing the Communion Song until the last person has received the Sacrament.

#### **Progress on Parish Project**

Painting is complete on the second floor where classrooms are located for Religious Education. Dry wall has been completed on the top floor where Parish Offices and additional classrooms are located. The stained-glass windows from the 1924 convent are to be installed throughout the building in the near future. The 1870 bell from the original convent of the Sisters of Charity is to be installed in the tower on top of the building. It will ring via electricity (like the Cathedral bell). The exterior wall on the alley side is 90% complete and compliments the limestone of the Cathedral and rectory. It looks quite beautiful! Work has now begun on the exterior wall on the Fourteenth Street side.

This week the Altoona Mirror showed the progress on the new lower parking lot. Storms drains have been installed. Lighting, paving, and landscaping are to follow. A guardrail is to be installed along the upper parking lot overlooking the lower parking lot. New lights will be installed in the upper parking along with a repaving.

All this work is possible because of the generosity of the Cathedral Parish family. Generations to come will benefit from the sacrifice and generosity of our generation. Thank you for your stewardship. Thank you for you faithful response to your pledge payments towards this capital project.
