Scripture Reflection

Isaiah describes a reversal of fortunes for the Israelites. The "darkness" metaphor might be interpreted as their oppression by other nations, as a perception that God had abandoned them. or as a more general sense of despair. But a great light has shone upon them and they have been rescued, called out of that darkness by God. Their joy is compared to the rejoicing at a good harvest: the rod and yoke of oppression have been lifted.

In the Gospel, we find two different calls. Jesus begins his ministry in northern Galilee. That is the area referred to in the Isaiah reading as the place where people had walked in darkness, and now Jesus will be the new light for them. In the second half of the reading, Jesus calls the first disciples and we witness their dramatic response. They leave their familiar lives for the unknown, and we are pressed to ponder that discipleship always involves trust in the Lord.

John the Baptist seems to have been a significant influence in the ministerial life of Jesus. But Jesus doesn't continue to baptize as John did. Jesus' work is proclamation and healing. The preaching has only begun when Jesus calls others to join him. The first four disciples---Peter, Andrew, James, and John---are all fishermen. Jesus invites them to come after him and their response is immediate.

"The people who sit in darkness have seen a great light" (Matthew 4:16). That light was needed in Isaiah's time, in Matthew's time, and even in Paul's time after Jesus walked the earth. It is still needed today. God uses us to fill the world's abyss with the light of Christ. We become instruments of light by heeding Jesus' call to repent, which means reorienting our lives to live the way of Jesus. He offers hope and life. Rather than viewing the world through glasses of doom and gloom. Christ helps us see that change is possible. Evil does not have the last word. Stand in Christ's light. Recharged, spread that light as the fishers of people we are called to be.
